Laptop Scheme



West Devon Borough Council shared £4,000 between Tavistock College and Okehampton College to spend on computers to help children currently struggling to access online learning at home. The £4,000 donation to the schools to buy computers has been funded through the Council's SeaMoor Lotto fund.

The Council agreed to use this fund to give schools money to help those children in the community who are struggling would make a huge difference. The Council has also identified a number of laptops that are no longer in use and will be sharing these with the schools to distribute. Fellowship Passports



have recently launched our Fellowship Passports initiative, which will help to keep students engaged and motivated in their learning. Students attending school and those learning remotely will receive points for accomplishing a variety of tasks

throughout the school day, including attending lessons, completing work, and getting involved with extracurricular activities such as taking part in a community initiative, an environmental project, or being an anti-bullying ambassador. Students have been challenged to achieve 100 points between now and May half-term; doing so will enable them to attend one of a number of events we are planning to host for students of different ages at the end of the summer term, in line with whatever Covid restrictions we may face, to celebrate what will have been an incredible year. We will of course be understanding if students are unable to achieve the total points required, but these Passports remain a positive incentive to keep students engaged and motivated with their learning.

Remote Learning

Dan Morrow has kicked things off quickly to support pupils during these difficult times in his first half term with the Trust. Since the beginning of January, we have greatly increased our remote learning provision for all pupils and have been working closely with the Department for Education to provide digital devices to disadvantaged pupils so they can fully access their remote learning. Our Trust has also partnered with Vodafone to provide SIM cards to pupils who do not have broadband access at home. The SIM cards will help pupils get online using their phone or tablet.


Bridestowe Primary School
